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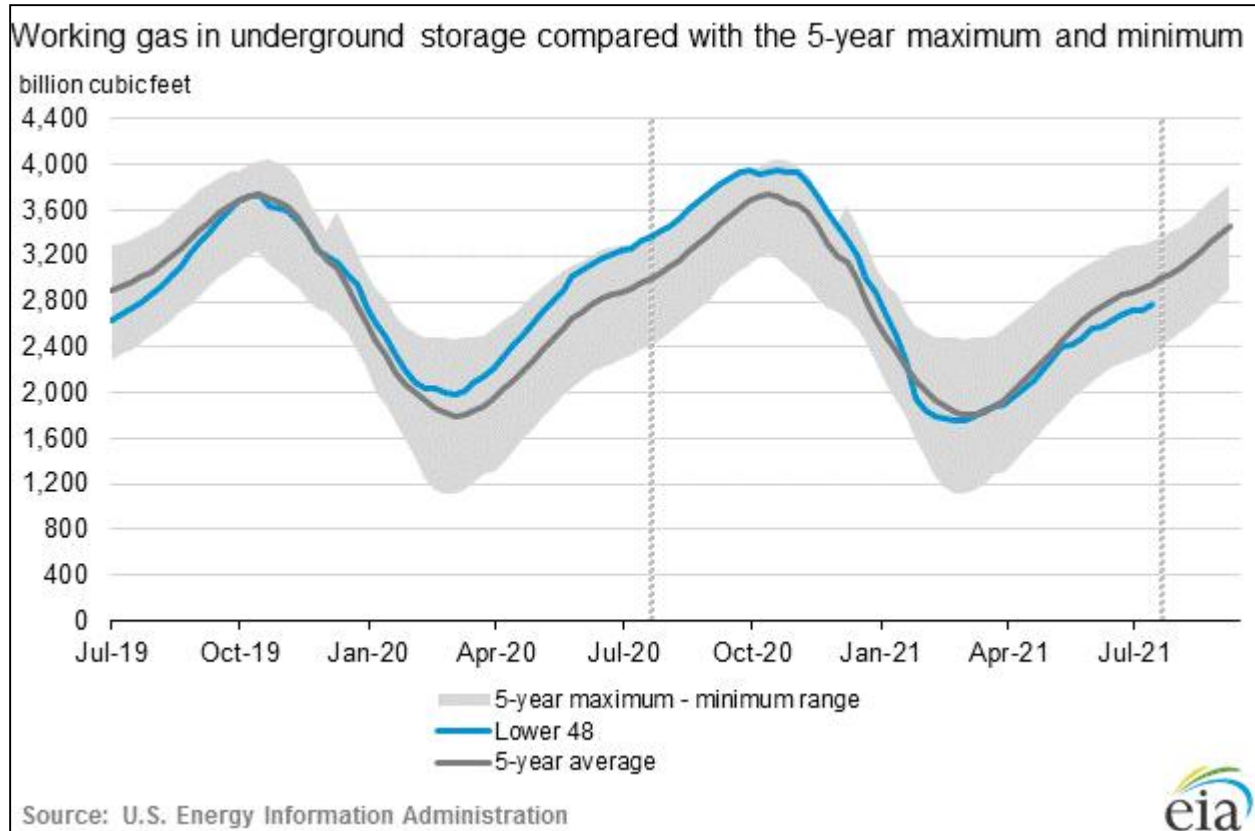

### Summary

Working gas in storage was 2,776 Bcf as of Friday, August 6, 2021, according to EIA estimates. This represents a net increase of 49 Bcf from the previous week. Stocks were 548 Bcf less than last year at this time and 178 Bcf below the five-year average of 2,954 Bcf. At 2,776 Bcf, total working gas is within the five-year historical range.



### Prices/Supply/Demand

**Northeast prices rise as high temperatures result in increased electricity demand for air conditioning.** At the Algonquin Citygate, which serves Boston-area consumers, the price went up \$1.07 from \$3.83/MMBtu last Wednesday to a weekly high of \$4.90/MMBtu yesterday. At the Transcontinental Pipeline Zone 6 trading point for New York City, prices also reached a weekly high yesterday, rising 34¢ from \$3.75/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$4.09/MMBtu yesterday. According to data from IHS Markit, natural gas consumed in the electric power sector in the Northeast increased 1.4 Bcf/d this week compared with last week. The National Weather Service put excessive heat warnings into effect this week for New York and areas of New England in Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island; heat index values up to 105°F are possible.

**Prices in the Appalachian Basin production region rise in response to increased demand in the Northeast.** The Tennessee Zone 4 Marcellus spot price increased 3¢ from \$3.61/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$3.64/MMBtu yesterday. Prices at the Tennessee Zone 4 hub reached a high of \$3.72/MMBtu on Monday. The price at Eastern Gas in southwest Pennsylvania rose 6¢ from \$3.65/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$3.71/MMBtu yesterday, after reaching a weekly high of \$3.76/MMBtu on Thursday.

**U.S. total supply declines for the second week in a row, as dry natural gas production and imports decline.** According to data from IHS Markit, the average total supply of natural gas fell by 0.3%, or 0.3 Bcf/d, compared with the previous report week. Dry natural gas production declined 0.1% (0.1 Bcf/d), net natural gas imports from Canada dropped 4.1% (0.2 Bcf/d), and send out from LNG import terminals decreased 1.6% to 0.06 Bcf/d.

**U.S. natural gas consumption rises in most sectors, offset somewhat by declines in the industrial sector and LNG export terminal pipeline receipts.** With temperatures trending slightly warmer than average over the past week, total U.S. consumption of natural gas rose by 2.3%, or 1.6 Bcf/d, compared with the previous report week, according to data from IHS Markit. Power generation and residential and commercial consumption rose by 3.2% and 5.6% (1.2 Bcf/d and 0.5 Bcf/d), respectively. Natural gas exports to Mexico increased 1.6%, or 0.1 Bcf/d. The industrial sector average volumes decreased slightly by 0.6%, or 0.1 Bcf/d, while average natural gas deliveries to U.S. LNG export facilities (LNG pipeline receipts) dropped 6.3% from last week to 9.9 Bcf/d, 0.6 Bcf/d lower than last week.

**U.S. LNG exports remain the same week over week.** Twenty-one LNG vessels (six from Sabine Pass, five from Freeport, four from Corpus Christi, three from Cameron, two from Cove Point, and one from Elba Island) with a combined LNG-carrying capacity of 77 Bcf departed the United States between August 5 and August 11, 2021, according to shipping data provided by Bloomberg Finance, L.P.

The ODNR quarterly report lists 2,723 horizontal shale wells, 2,674 of which reported oil and natural gas production during the quarter.

There are currently 3,428 Utica Permits, and 2,914 Utica shale wells drilled.

There was a total of 2,326,539,953 Bcf produced in the calendar year of 2020.

As of July 4, the national total rig count increased to 470.

The 2020 Oilfield Patriot Award was presented to Lancaster, Ohio resident Don Huck. Just one example of his efforts is that he has worked tirelessly, for the last year, on resolving orphan well issues around the state, by compiling large amounts of data, including detailed maps, so that the industry and regulators can better understanding the situation so the issue can begin to be resolved.

The 2021 Oilfield Patriot Award was presented to Gene Huck from Warren Township in Washington County. As an example of his efforts he has spent countless hours, day in and day out, on the rule making process at the statehouse and with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Oil and Gas Resources. Once a bill is passed, rules have to be put into place to enforce the legislation and that is a painstaking process to get right.

*“The Oilfield Patriot Award was made for folks like Gene and Don Huck,” said Matt Hammond, President of the Ohio Oil and Gas Association. “The lasting legacy they are leaving behind on Ohio’s oil and gas industry is bringing countless benefits to the industry. ### **Recognizing anniversary of worker's death, US Department of Labor urges western New Yorkers to safeguard against hot weather hazards** *OSHA information, resources are available to help prevent heat illness*

**BUFFALO** – On July 7, 2020, 35-year-old Timothy Barber collapsed at the end of his shift after working on the Genesee River Bridge Project in Geneseo. Treated for heat stress and heat exhaustion, he died from hyperthermia on his second day on the job.

Recognizing the anniversary of Barber's death, the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration reminds western New York employers and workers that when temperatures soar, so does the degree of danger associated with work in high temperatures. OSHA also urges all to take proper actions to work safely in hot weather.

An OSHA investigation into Barber's death found he had been performing light duty work, sorting bolts in 90-plus degree temperatures. Working alone without shade, he was without water and not acclimated to the heat. OSHA also determined that his employer, Pavilion Drainage Supply Company Inc. of Pavilion, failed to train him and implement other safeguards to protect him and other employees against extreme heat hazards.

"Timothy Barber should not have died. We call attention to this worker's death so that other workers do not suffer from or succumb to heat-related death and illnesses. They are preventable," said OSHA Area Director Michael Scime in Buffalo. "Employers are responsible for providing workplaces free of known safety hazards. This includes protecting workers from extreme heat."

"We hope something positive comes out of the tragic death of our son, Tim," said James and Kathy Barber, his parents. "We join OSHA in wanting to bring awareness to the dangers of heat stroke to businesses for the safety of their employees. No family should have to suffer a loss that is completely preventable."

Symptoms of excessive heat exposure include heat stroke, heat stress, cramps, headaches, dizziness, weakness, nausea, heavy sweating and confusion. Occupational factors that may contribute to heat illness include high temperature and humidity, low fluid consumption, direct sun exposure, no shade, limited air movement, physical exertion or use of bulky protective clothing and equipment.

Employers with workers exposed to high temperatures should establish and implement a heat illness prevention program and communicate it to supervisors and workers. This includes:

Providing workers with water, rest and shade.

Allowing new or returning workers to gradually increase workloads and take more frequent breaks as they acclimatize to, or build a tolerance for, working in the heat.

Planning for emergencies and training workers on heat hazards and appropriate first aid measures.

## Warren graduate awarded scholarship

A Washington County native is one of several higher education students statewide who were recently awarded a scholarship through The Ohio Oil and Gas Energy Education Foundation.

DeFreitas fell in love with welding through her exposure to her stepfather, who is a steel worker in Marietta. In high school, she earned multiple certifications through the Washington County Career Center.

*“I am actually going to be a certified welding engineer,”* DeFreitas said. *“It’s a blessing and it feels amazing ... I didn’t think I would be going this far with this career ... I hope to one day inspire women around the world to work in a man’s career field.”*

Since 2007, the OOGEEP has awarded over half a million dollars in scholarships to over 300 students who desire to enter the industry.

DeFreitas’ other passions included her participation in softball at Warren, as well as rodeo and raising animals for Washington County 4-H on her family farm. She was the president of Future Farmers of America (FFA) at Warren.

Monitoring workers for signs of illness and taking prompt action if symptoms occur. "Don't wait until a worker is sickened to address heat stress – take action," said Scime. "Employers in Western New York and other areas must take action to keep workers from becoming ill. Effective preparation and knowledge of the hazards of heat can save lives today, and in the future. Three simple words: Water, Rest, Shade can make a huge difference when implemented in the workplace."

OSHA's Occupational Exposure to Heat page explains what employers can do to keep workers safe and what workers need to know, including factors for heat illness, adapting to working in indoor and outdoor heat, protecting workers, recognizing symptoms and first aid training. The page also includes resources for specific industries and OSHA workplace standards.

## Confusion Over New Mask Mandates

Over the course of just a few weeks recommendations and restrictions have been thrown around by government entities and companies are scrambling to understand what they need to do. To make matters worse state and local standards are not following the same guidelines, leading to widespread confusion and anger. When President Biden and other government officials declared that any fully vaccinated person did not need to wear a mask, the angry trend started.

Those same officials are now blaming the unvaccinated for the new delta trend that has started spreading through the country. Using this new strain to get more people to willingly get the vaccine has caused even more confusion with the mix of reporting stating that the vaccine does not prevent one from getting the disease. This is not the first-time mixed signals have been reported during this pandemic.

The biggest controversy is that some restaurants and establishments are now requiring proof of vaccine before customers can enter the building. The silver lining for employers is that this is not the first time during this pandemic that there has been confusion on what to do. Now, they're more prepared to changed procedures and able to adapt to the current circumstances.

Attorneys state that employers are allowed to ask the vaccination status of their employees and are not affected by HIPAA. Accurate information must be gathered to safely lift COVID guidelines and safety protocols.

Employers should continue to keep up to date with current CDC guidelines and create policies that are flexible and consistent. A mindful approach is needed to avoid additional confusion and chaos upon returning to work.

The CDC now recommends that even the fully vaccinated wear masks, especially when living with high-risk people. A COVID test should be performed 3-5 days after a known exposure and wear a mask for 14 days or until a negative result is received. Something to remember is that these are just recommendations and not mandates.

They changed the forms and first wanted social security numbers for royalty owners, Meter serial numbers.etc. They came out with new forms on or about August 5, 2021.

Our software providers did not send us our updates until August 20, so we had 10 days to get our tax info sent in. What a mess. I encourage you if you have any problems , write them a letter and ask for an extension. This has made it difficult for many producers to meet the deadline. But you do not have to provide Social security numbers for royalty owners.
