
Summary

Working gas in storage was 1,902 Bcf as of Friday, May 27, 2022, according to EIA estimates. This represents a net increase of 90 Bcf from the previous week. Stocks were 397 Bcf less than last year at this time and 337 Bcf below the five-year average of 2,239 Bcf. At 1,902 Bcf, total working gas is within the five-year historical range.

Prices/Supply/Demand

Northeast prices decrease as mild weather on average for the week results in lower consumption. At the Algonquin Citygate, which serves <u>Boston-area consumers</u>, the price went down 19 cents from \$9.03/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$8.84/MMBtu yesterday. At the Transcontinental Pipeline Zone 6 trading point for New York City, the price decreased 38 cents from \$8.23/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$7.85/MMBtu yesterday. According to data from PointLogic, natural gas consumption in all sectors in the Northeast fell by 0.7 Bcf/d (5%) from a week ago, led by a 15% decrease in consumption in the residential and commercial sectors. Temperatures in the <u>Boston</u> and <u>New</u> <u>York</u> areas were above normal, resulting in lower heating demand.

Prices in the Appalachian production region fall as in-region demand decreases. The Tennessee Zone 4 Marcellus spot price decreased 35 cents from \$7.85/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$7.50/MMBtu yesterday. The price at Eastern Gas South in southwest Pennsylvania fell 49 cents from \$8.11/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$7.62/MMBtu yesterday. Natural gas consumption in the Appalachian production region fell by 0.5 Bcf/d (8%), led by an 11% decrease in consumption in the electric power sector week over week, according to data from PointLogic. Production in the Appalachian Basin increased 0.5 Bcf/d (2%) week over week south to an average of 6.5 Bcf/d. The increase in southbound natural gas flows was offset somewhat by a decrease in flows to the Midwest of 0.2 Bcf/d (3%) to an average of 6.1 Bcf/d.

U.S. natural gas supply increases week over week. Overall U.S. natural gas supply rose by 0.4% (0.4 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week, largely due to increased production from the Appalachian Basin, according to data from PointLogic. Dry natural gas production grew by 0.5% (0.5 Bcf/d), and average net imports from Canada decreased by 2.7% (0.1 Bcf/d) from the previous report week provided by Bloomberg Finance, L.P.

U.S. natural gas demand falls as temperatures moderate toward normal. Total U.S. consumption of natural gas fell by 4.3% (2.7 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week, according to data from PointLogic. <u>Temperatures</u> have generally moderated across the United States despite some isolated pockets of higher- and lower-than-normal temperatures. The residential and commercial sectors accounted for the largest decrease in consumption week over week, falling by 19.7% (2.3 Bcf/d). Natural gas deliveries to U.S. LNG export facilities (LNG pipeline receipts) also fell slightly, averaging 12.8 Bcf/d, or 0.2 Bcf/d lower than last week. Industrial sector consumption declined by 1.8% (0.4 Bcf/d) week over week. Natural gas consumed for power generation also fell slightly, declining by 0.3% (0.1 Bcf/d) week over week. Natural gas exports to Mexico increased by 1.2% (0.1 Bcf/d).

U.S. LNG exports decrease by one vessel this week from last week. Twenty-three LNG vessels (eight from Sabine Pass, four each from Cameron and Corpus Christi, three from Freeport, two from Calcasieu Pass, and one each from Cove Point and Elba Island) with a combined LNG-carrying capacity of 85 Bcf departed the United States between May 26 and June 1, according to shipping data provided by Bloomberg Finance, L.P.



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Marginal Well Credit for 2020 Natural Gas Production Announced


Oil and Gas Industry Services Group Baker Tilly May 2022

The Internal Revenue Service announced May 10, 2022 in Notice 2022-18 that the Marginal Well Production Credit (MWC) for natural gas production from qualifying wells in calendar year 2021 is \$0.67 per mcf for the first 18mcf of daily production.

The MWC rates for prior years were 2020 production \$.66, 2019 production \$0.08, 2018 production \$0.00, 2017 production \$0.51, and 2016 production of \$0.14 per mcf for the first 18mcf of daily production from a marginal well. The credits may be used to offset regular income tax but may not offset alternative minimum tax. Any unused credit in a year is carried back 5 years to obtain refunds. Any remaining unused credits are carried forward up to 20 years to offset future year's income tax.

Heat Illness Prevention Curtis Speck, CEO/President Safety Resources Company of Ohio, Inc.

Every year, dozens of workers die and thousands more become ill while working in hot or humid conditions. OSHA has developed a Heat Illness Prevention Campaign to address the dangers of working in the heat. OSHA has identified approximately 70 high-risk industries for targeted enforcement activity. This means that OSHA can now launch heat-related inspections on high-risk worksites before workers suffer preventable injuries, illnesses or fatalities.

The program establishes heat priority days when the heat index is expected to be 80° F or higher. On any heat priority days OSHA will initiate compliance assistance in the targeted high-risk industries and will also inspect any alleged heat-related fatality/catastrophe, coplaint or referral regardless of whether the worksite fall within a targeted industry.

OSHA is encouraging employers to protect workers from heat hazards by providing access to water, rest, shade, training and acclimitization procesures. The program contains both compliance and outreach assistance components.

Factors that contribute to the development of heat illness include high temperature and humidity, low fluid consumption, direct sun exposure (with no shade) or extreme heat, limited air movement (no breeze or wind), heavy physical exertion, use of bulky protective clothing and equipment, alcohol or caffeine consumption, lack of physical fitness and other pesonal medical conditions.

During warm or hot weather, workers should be encouraged to consume an adequate amount of fluids (water or sports drinks), take frequent breaks out of the heat (in shady areas or air conditioning) and monitor each other for signs of heat illness. The first few days working in the heat are the most dangerous. Workers need to be acclimatized to working in warm or hot environments.

Common signs and symptoms of heat related illnesses:

- Heat stroke: confusion, slurred speech, unconsciousness, seizures, heavy sweating or hot, dry skin, very high body temperature, rapid heart rate THIS IS A MEDICAL EMERGENCY Call 911
- Heat Exhaustion: fatigue, irritability, thirst, nausea or vomiting, dizziness or lightheadedness, heavy sweating, elevated body temperature or fast heart rate
- Heat Cramps: Muscle spasms or pain usually in legs, arms or trunk.

If any of the above signs are present, promptly provide first aid. First aid for heat related illness involves the following principals: take the affected worker to a cooler area (shade or air conditioning), cool the worker immediately using active cooling techniques such as removing outer layers of clothing, placing ice or cold wet towels on the head, neck, trunk, airpits and groin, using fans to circulate air around the worker, and immersing the worker in cold water.

When in doubt – cool the worker and call 911

WEST VIRGINIA UPDATE

Transportation of Ethane and NGL (Natural Gas Liquids), is done so via pipelines. MarkWest, a large natural gas gathering and processing company, has pipelines, the Liberty Ethane and Liberty NGL, along the I-70 corridor in Ohio County, West Virginia. These pipelines are crucial in moving fluids from the Sherwood Plant in Doddridge Co., WV and the Mobley Plant in Wetzel Co., WV. Underneath some parts of this pipeline is coal which Tunnel Ridge intends on and has permits to longwall mine. Doing so would force MarkWest to shut in these pipelines and cut off their transportation.

This would leave MarkWest without the ability to move these products, also, slow production of every company that sends gas through, and a loss of royalty payments to 1000's of West Virginia royalty owners. Mark-West seeks to condemn this coal because of the adverse effects mining it would have. The Ohio County Circuit Court ruled in favor of Tunnel Ridge and MarkWest has appealed this ruling to the West Virginia Supreme Court.
